

## The West's Best Multiday Trips

Who doesn't love to spend a week on the river? Chances are you've already done several of the best multiday trips in the west. But I'll bet there are a few still on the ol' bucket list. To be included on this list, runs must be raftable, > 20 miles, and within a day of Olympia. Runs have been rated based on camp quality, whitewater quality, wilderness, crowds, and scenery. A few true classics have been omitted, as I don't have first hand experience with them: Dolores, Gates of Lodore, Desolation Canyon, The Grand, the Smith, and anything in California.

### #10 The Klickitat, Washington

Perhaps least familiar on this list, the Klickitat is one of the longest III overnight trips possible in Washington. The upper basalt canyon is busy and full of fast decisions and lovely walls. Catch an eddy, because this is a special part of the trip. As the rapids ease, the canyon transitions to arid oak and grass bluffs and more bedrock. There's great camping along the lower river, and I hear the fishing's good too. An idyllic spring getaway, the Klickitat has been a go-to overnight destination for decades. Camps: 6 ww: 6 wild: 6 scenic: 7 managed: no

### #9: John Day, Oregon

The John Day deserves its recent promotion to permitted river. It may not have whitewater, but if you like to boat camp and unplug, there is no better combination of great camps, mellow floating, great hiking, and long mileage in the whole of the northwest. Canoe it. Take the scout patrol. Bass fish it in April. Make 50 mile days at high water. Hike everyday. Nap everyday. You can entertain yourself in any camping fashion you can imagine, heck, bring the kids! Just don't expect rapids (save Clarno) and don't underestimate cold rain, low flow, and upstream winds in late winter. Camps: 8 ww: 3 wild: 6 scenic: 7 managed: yes

### #8 Grande Ronde, Oregon

Want good camps? Warm weather? Fun splashy rapids anyone can run? Only got a weekend? Well, we have that. The Grande Ronde is another of the several runs that will let you float all the way to Heller Bar on the Snake. Or you can go as short as 40 miles from Minam to Troy. Just don't expect to have it to yourself. Do expect a good camp on all but the busiest weekends. Even the secondary camps are superb. As

flows recede and the whitewater mellows, the swimming holes come into their prime. Late summer trips are spent in the river as much as possible. After you've done the 2 night routine a few times, come back for a longer trip and linger. It's an excellent ponderosa and basalt canyon, with lots of nooks to explore. Once of the best runs around if you strike out on permits. Camps: 8 ww: 4 wild: 7 scenic: 8 managed: no

### #7 The Selway, Idaho

The Selway has a lot to offer. Preseason big water flushes, white sand beaches, late summer low water floats. It's the toughest permit to pull, now that the Colorado permit system has been fixed. But it is well worth the effort. The rapids are classic and very similar to the Lochsa. The wilderness aspect however adds a more ominous feel to the big water class IV. And of course, those Idaho white sand beaches make camp so welcoming. Best have your A game if you go above 5 feet at Paradise. Camps: 7 ww: 8 wild: 7 scenic: 7 managed: yes

### #6 The Salt, Arizona

The Salt is a true classic. It's no class III float.

It's not easy to exit the canyon, even where there's "road" access. It's not a forgiving lush environment. And it's powerfully beautiful, with massive unbroken walls, ruins, side hikes, waterfalls, gnarled trees of immense dignity, uncrowded unlike our own trees. When it has water, there is quality class IV wilderness boating. Yes, it's permitted, and yes it's a long way away, but the Salt is a whitewater gem. Camps: 6 ww: 8 wild: 8 scenic: 8 managed: yes

#### #5 South Fork Salmon, Idaho

The SFS is the Salmon drainage's unsung little bro. Take the boulder rapids of the Illinois, slam 'em into the Middle Form Salmon canyon from Boundary to Indian Creek, except with the walls of Impassible Canyon, and you have a fair idea of the SF Salmon. If you run it low, it's busy technical IV, with one standout V. If you run it high, it consequential, continuous, wilderness class V. The famous Idaho sunshine, white sand beaches, and ponderosa camps reward those who sacri-

fice a little gnar for an extended sun n sand float. Some say the 20 mile paddle out to Vinegar on the Main Salmon detracts from the trip. They are same folks who ignore the Tilton because of 10 minutes of rowing. Pay the price, oh so steep, of that 3-4 hour scenic trip through one of the biggest river canyons east of the Rockies. You'll have had your whitewater fill by then anyway. Camps: 9 ww: 8 wild: 7 scenic: 8 managed: no

#### #4 The Yampa, Colorado

The epitome of canyon boating in my opinion. Wilder than the Grand. Better camping than the Salt or Desolation or Cataract. Multicolored walls that soar so tall, 200 foot trees clinging against them look like matchsticks. Excellent hiking abounds. Go early to avoid the bugs and the crowds. The Yampa is the largest, biggest, wildest free flowing branch of the Colorado left to us. Go see it. Prepare to gawk. Make sure to layover at least once, and for heaven's sake, take the maximum number of days. You'll be dream-

ing about this one for years afterwards. Camps: 8 ww: 7 wild: 7 scenic: 10 managed: yes

#### #3 Middle Fork Salmon, Idaho

It's the Middle Fork. The standard against which the rest are stacked. The camps are superb, the whitewater varies from fun pleasant technical floating to survival log dodging floodlust, depending on season and flow. Hot springs, wildlife, historic ranches, petroglyphs. One hundred wild, scenic miles. It can't be called wilderness (the planes! the crowds!) though it is in a huge wilderness area. It's got a friendly culture and people visit for a reason. Rarely only once. Permit competition is fierce. Got a permit slot, ol' buddy ol' pal? Me neither. Camps: 9 ww: 8 wild: 7 scenic: 9 managed: yes

#### #2 The Illinois, Oregon

Think this one's a stretch? I dunno. Ever seen so many good rapids, with such stunning lovely water, in so wild a place, with so

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few people clamoring to use it? You get a nice little warm up, some II then some III. A couple IVs the first day, feelin' good. Then it's on. Catch your breath between drops, and try to enjoy the waterfalls and canyon walls. Immerse yourself in the lush forest of the Kalmiopsis Wilderness, one of the most biologically diverse regions on the continent. Did I mention the carnivorous flora? You've probably run a class IV and 2 class III's in the time it's taken you to read this little blurb. It's a versatile river; assuming the weather forecast is favorable (mandatory). Enjoy it as a technical class IV trip below 1000. Dig in for some big water class V above 2500. My personal take on the Illinois is avoid the New Year's trip in favor of the May trip. The good weather report will be more trustworthy. You'll have 20 degree higher temps, 4 more hours of daylight, and you can easily find 1500 in late April to early May of many years. Get it before they permit it. Camps: 8. ww: 9 wild: 9 scenic: 9 managed: yes

**#1 Jarbidge-Bruneau Rivers, Idaho**

Each section by itself would make this list. Combined, it's a unique wilderness adventure not to be matched in the Northwest. The Bruneau, like its sister the Owyhee, is an early spring desert river. Tighter, steeper, much less frequently run, the canyons of the Jarbidge-Bruneau surpass description. The whitewater, however, does

not. Up top, it's intermittent class II-III. Juniper benches, blind corners, a few boulders: easy miles. Then you hit the rapids. There's a new portage (boo!) then a dozen miles of class III and IV delight. Camps are rare, but you only need one and there's no competition. The classic signature Jarbidge Falls portage (don't miss the eddy!) should be approached with good cheer, safety, and patience (you could be at work, you know). Below the portage, the work is over and it's clear sailing. The canyon briefly opens only a couple times in the 70 mile trip. Though the whitewater eases below the falls, the canyon gets ever deeper and more spectacular. Established camps are superb, but small. Hiking consists of clawing your way up steep grassy slopes to amphitheaters 400' above the river. Where the Rogue is a known float trip, with myriad options for recovery from a mistake, the Jarbidge Bruneau is a wilderness adventure unlike any other trip on this list. There will be wood in class IV moves you will not read about on the internet before hand. No one will have a spare oar blade in the next camp, because no one is within 50 miles of you in any direction. Egress from the canyon is possible in perhaps a dozen spots, and involves dozens of miles of hiking. The only road access is one even locals hesitate to drive. The perfect place to get lost in river time. Camps: 8. ww: 9 wild: 10 scenic: 10 managed: no

### **Cispus III**


Although access can be a challenge, the Cispus a longtime classic of Washington boating. The Upper has a few larger drops, and the lower has some challenges to the takeout, but the whole thing is scenic and lots of surfing is on tap.

### **Pilchuck Creek IV**

The Pilchuck is one of Washington's finest class IV floodlust rivers. Usually a kayak run, the whole thing is raftable. Scout the falls on the way to putin, look for a significant rain event, and hold on tight on this freight train!

### **Tumater V**

Take Tumwater laps up a notch -- do 'em in the snow and ice! You'll have the canyon to yourself and you'll really appreciate the committed nature of the right bank, so very far from the road. Scout and be sure you are ready for this one!

# Green River Cleanup May 5th

It's time again to mark your calendars for the 28th annual Green River Cleanup. Grab your family and friends on May 5th and help WRRR clean one of the most beautiful rivers in the NW.

Recent reports indicate the high water flush in Late February removed the wood from The Nozzle. The right and middle slots at Let's Make a Deal do have wood, but the rest of the run is clean!
